Annual Meeting is Nigh!



And now a word about our sponsor. You. The Annual Meeting will be held following the Potluck on May 21st. As is our usual wont, the Potluck will immediately follow **John Bell's** service. At this juncture, that date is just around the corner and according to the Rules of Conduct, certain information must be published to all members six weeks prior to the meeting. Here then, are the pertinent details:

The Nominating Committee has come up with the following slate of Officers:

Additionally, there will be some proposed amendments of the Code of Regulations presented for a vote of adoption at that time. Thanks go to **Colin Dunbar** for both making the initial proposal and coming up with the wording on the first one. It is proposed that suitable re-numbering be done to insert the following:

Article VII. Trustees

D. The Board of Trustees shall prepare each year a proposed budget for the ensuing fiscal year. The Board shall present it to the members of the Fellowship at the Annual Meeting for consideration, possible amendment, and a simple majority vote on adoption. The proposed budget shall be contained in the notice of meeting.

Yet another proposed change in the C. of R. was initially made by **John Bell**. The Executive Committee has already adopted similar wording for its own internal use. To make it applicable across the board, it must be inserted into the C. of R. An additional article would be inserted:

Article XII. Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern the Fellowship in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with this Code of Regulations and any special rules of order the Fellowship may adopt.

Oh yes, and one more thing—we will be voting on "switching" ministers back to Chuck Thomas as our regular 1/4 time minister and Richard Venus as an occasional one. In other words, to put things back the way they were.

I mentioned about you being our sponsor. Well, I was not referring to your monetary support at this particular juncture, but rather your participatory support. Oh no, I don't mean your attendance at services, hosting or attending SNLs or pitching in for special events either. I am referring to your participation in our various Standing Committees. These are the formal means of making all the rest of the above actually work. And you can help. You don't even have to be a member.

A few newsletters back. I made note of the fact that I could find absolutely NOTHING in the Code of Regulations that prohibited non-members from serving on committees other than the Executive Committee. Now while you are entirely welcome to be a "permanent visitor" if you wish, you are also welcome to serve as a member of one of these committees. Not required, not even urged—but invited. After all, everyone is also invited to attend an Exec. Comm. Meeting, as a matter of well-established precedent. Flower Communion

Remember to bring a flower of your choice on April 16!!

The flower communion was brought to the United States in 1940 and introduced to the members of our Cambridge, Massachusetts, church by Maja V. Capek. The service has spread to many of our Unitarian Universalist congregations and has been adapted along the way.

Then, as now, people were asked to bring a

flower of their choice, either from their own gardens. or from the field or roadside. When they arrived at church a large vase stood waiting in the vestibule, attended by two young members of the Church School. Each person was asked to place their own flower in the vase.

This signified that it was by their own free will they joined with the others. The vase that contained all the flowers was a symbol of the united church fellowship.

The young attendants helped with the arrangement of the bouquet. Later they carried the vase up to the front of the auditorium and placed it on a table there. Maja's husband, Dr. Capek, then said a prayer, after which he walked over and consecrated the flowers while the congregation stood. The two attendants then took the vase back out into the vestibule.

After the service, as people left the church, they went to the vase and each took a flower from the vase other than the one that they had brought. The significance of the flower communion is that as no two flowers are alike, so no two people are alike, yet each has a contribution to make. Together the different flowers form a beautiful bouquet. Our common bouquet would not be the same without the unique addition of each individual flower, and thus it is with our church community, it would not be the same without each and every one of us. Thus this service is a statement of our community.

By exchanging flowers, we show our willingness to walk together in our Search for truth, disregarding all that might divide us. Each person takes home a flower brought by someone else - thus symbolizing our shared celebration in community. This communion of sharing is essential to a free people of a free religion.
